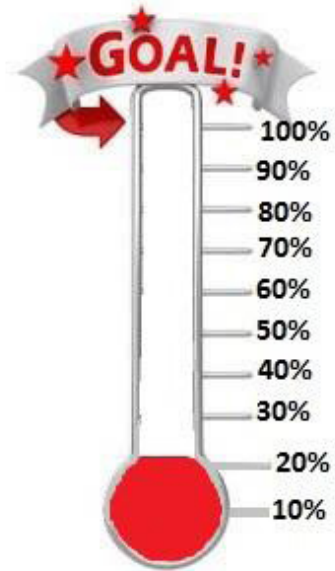

International Adds Focus on Diabetes

Diabetes can also take someone's sight, especially children. In 2015, 303 million Americans, or 9.4% of the population had diabetes. Approximately 1.25 million American children and adults have Type 1 diabetes and 1.5 million Americans are diagnosed with diabetes every year.

Diabetes was the 7th leading cause of death in the US in 2015 and in addition to blindness, diabetes can cause the loss of limbs.

If you are planning a club project, I suggest you partner with your local hospital to see if they have a diabetes educator and work with them to get the word out about this major U.S. health problem.
